# DIRECTOR'S FOREWORD

The Central Narcotics Bureau (CNB) turned a new chapter in 2022, as we bid a fond farewell to our outgoing Director CNB, Mr Ng Ser Song.

Mr Ng had an illustrious 35-year career in the Home Team, including over 10 years in his appointment as Director CNB. Under his leadership, CNB's enforcement capabilities grew from strength to strength even in a challenging operating environment. He also emphasised the importance of preventive drug education (PDE), and focused CNB's efforts towards effective rehabilitation so that drug abusers can turn away from drugs for good. We express our immense

gratitude to Mr Ng for his stewardship and wish him a happy retirement.

Amidst these changes, CNB's commitment to a drug-free Singapore has remained constant. In 2022, CNB made significant drug seizures with an estimated value of \$16.66 million, and crippled 23 drug syndicates through rigorous anti-drug enforcement operations. Together with our Home Team counterparts, 11 island-wide operations and 783 operations were conducted at the checkpoints to intercept attempts to smuggle drugs into Singapore.

## Global Drug Landscape

Beyond Singapore, the international and regional drug situation remains challenging. The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) estimated that 284 million people worldwide used drugs in 2020, an increase of 26% from 2010. Regionally, East and Southeast Asia are among the world's major methamphetamine production and trafficking markets. This is reflected in the large seizures of methamphetamine and high proportion of methamphetamine abusers in the region.

Apart from methamphetamine, the shifting attitudes towards cannabis globally is also worrying. Cannabis abuse continues to increase globally, fuelled by commercial interests and widespread misperceptions on its risks and health effects, despite clear, scientific evidence of the detrimental effects of cannabis abuse. Within the region, Thailand has become the first Southeast Asian country to decriminalise cannabis abuse and legalise it for medical use.

These global and regional influences will invariably affect Singapore. Methamphetamine, heroin and cannabis remain the three most commonly abused drugs in Singapore. In 2022, the number of cannabis abusers arrested has increased by 71% from 2021. There has also been a rise in youth cannabis abusers arrested, and in the quantity of cannabis seized, as compared to 2021.

## Preventive Education and Strengthening Partnerships

PDE and community engagement continue to be integral in CNB's anti-drug strategy. CNB has maintained our physical community-nuanced preventive education and outreach efforts, through the Dadah Itu Haram ('DIH' or 'Drugs are Forbidden') and Bothaiporulai Ethirthu Nirpom ('BEN' or 'We Stand United Against Drugs') campaigns, to spread anti-

drug awareness among the Malay-Muslim and Indian communities respectively. An anti-drug abuse campaign organised in 2022 saw 35 community partners illuminating their buildings in green or white, as a show of support for the drug-free cause.

CNB has also embarked on dynamic methods to educate our youth on the harms of drugs and to counter pro-drug abuse narratives. In 2022, CNB collaborated with schools and Institutes of Higher Learning to co-create various anti-drug campaigns with students and youths. To increase our youth outreach, CNB also launched our TikTok account in September 2022 to engage them on the anti-drug message and correct common misconceptions on drugs, including cannabis abuse.

International partnerships and cooperation are also critical in the fight against drugs. Buoyed by the easing of COVID-19 travel and border restrictions, CNB participated in several ASEAN and international meetings, notably the 65<sup>th</sup> Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) and the 13<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Drug Monitoring Network Meeting to contribute to the global discourse on drug policies. CNB also organised two workshops on Singapore's Drug Control Strategy in 2022 to share our comprehensive approaches with international partners. This is in line with Singapore's commitment to contribute to the capability development of international drug enforcement counterparts and to promote international cooperation.

CNB has also undertaken efforts to enhance the capabilities of our officers. CNB has embarked on a five-year Training and Learning Masterplan that will prepare CNB officers for future challenges. In 2022, the inaugural AGC-CNB Workshop was organised to upskill and familiarise CNB officers with court processes and field documentation. We also introduced the Basic Enforcement Tradecraft Course to provide new officers with hands-on tradecraft and public engagement training. Apart from training, CNB continued to leverage on new technologies to transform the way we work, through various innovation initiatives. For example, CNB launched portable

drug screening test kits in 2022 to augment the capabilities of ground officers, and made further progress on other technological projects, such as body-worn cameras and the Automated Exhibit Management System (AEMS).

## Forging ahead in 2023

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, CNB officers had worked tirelessly in an uncertain landscape to keep Singapore safe from the harms of drugs, and I am thankful for their unwavering commitment and courage. We have also made great progress in our transformation efforts, and have continued to refine our community engagement strategies and legislation to meet evolving needs.

These efforts will continue. While there will be new challenges in 2023, especially in view of global drug trends, CNB will remain steadfast in our mission to enforce, educate and engage for a drug-free Singapore.

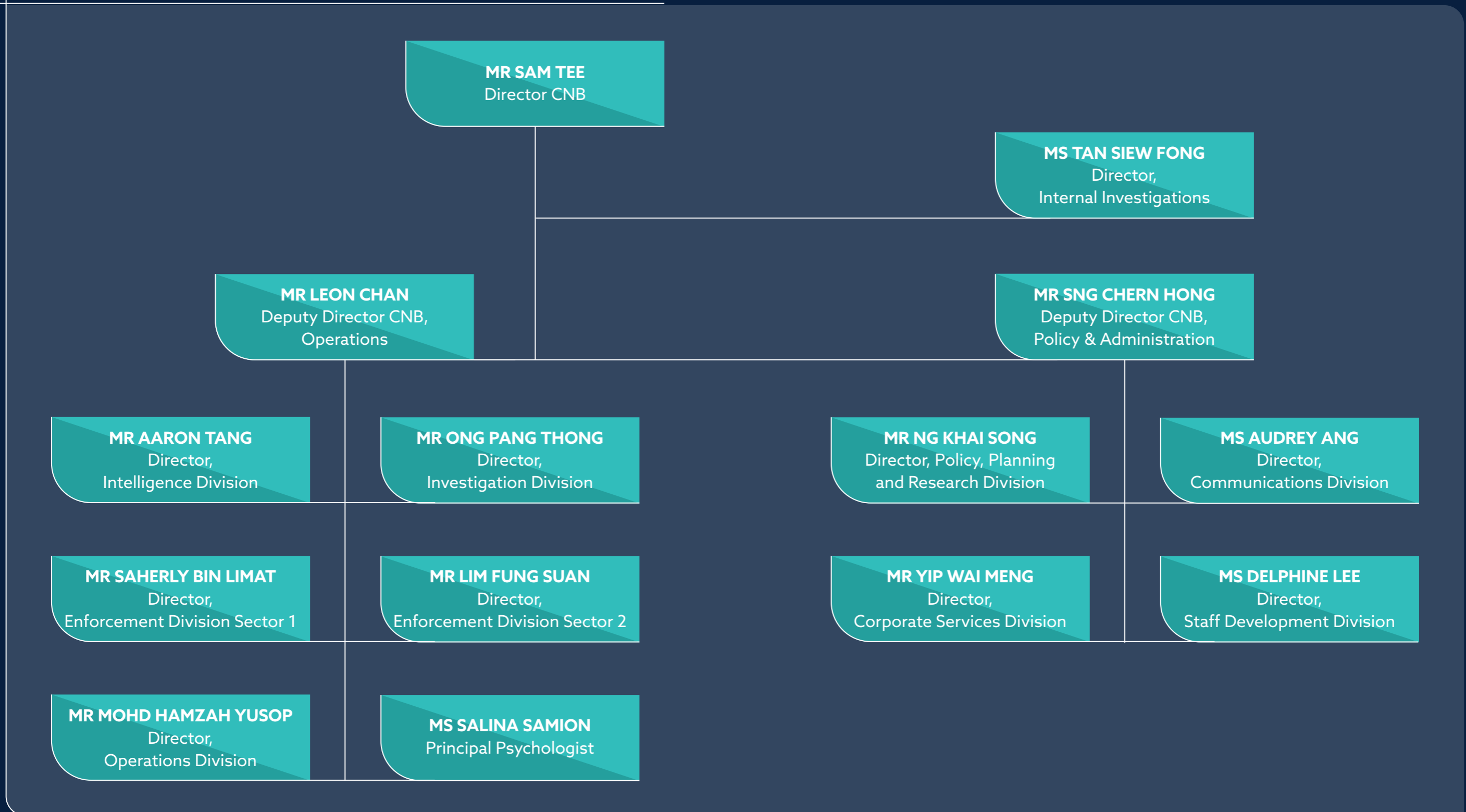

## Transforming Enforcement, Education and Engagement for a Drug-Free Singapore

In CNB, we continuously build on a culture of transformation and innovation, where ground-up suggestions from officers to streamline work processes are implemented and celebrated.

### Behavioural Insights Workshop

In collaboration with Yellow Ribbon Singapore (YRSG), CNB conducted a Behavioural Insights

(BI) workshop for officers to understand how human behaviour can affect decision making and be an enabler for innovation.

### Project FAST Bags

Project FAST Bags was conceptualised to fully optimise storage space in the land divisions. The FAST Bags enable CNB to store twice the quantity of pistols and accessories in a

four-tier metal safe, and have resulted in cost savings. The project was awarded the Home Team Innovation (Silver) Award at the Minister's Awards Presentation Ceremony 2022.

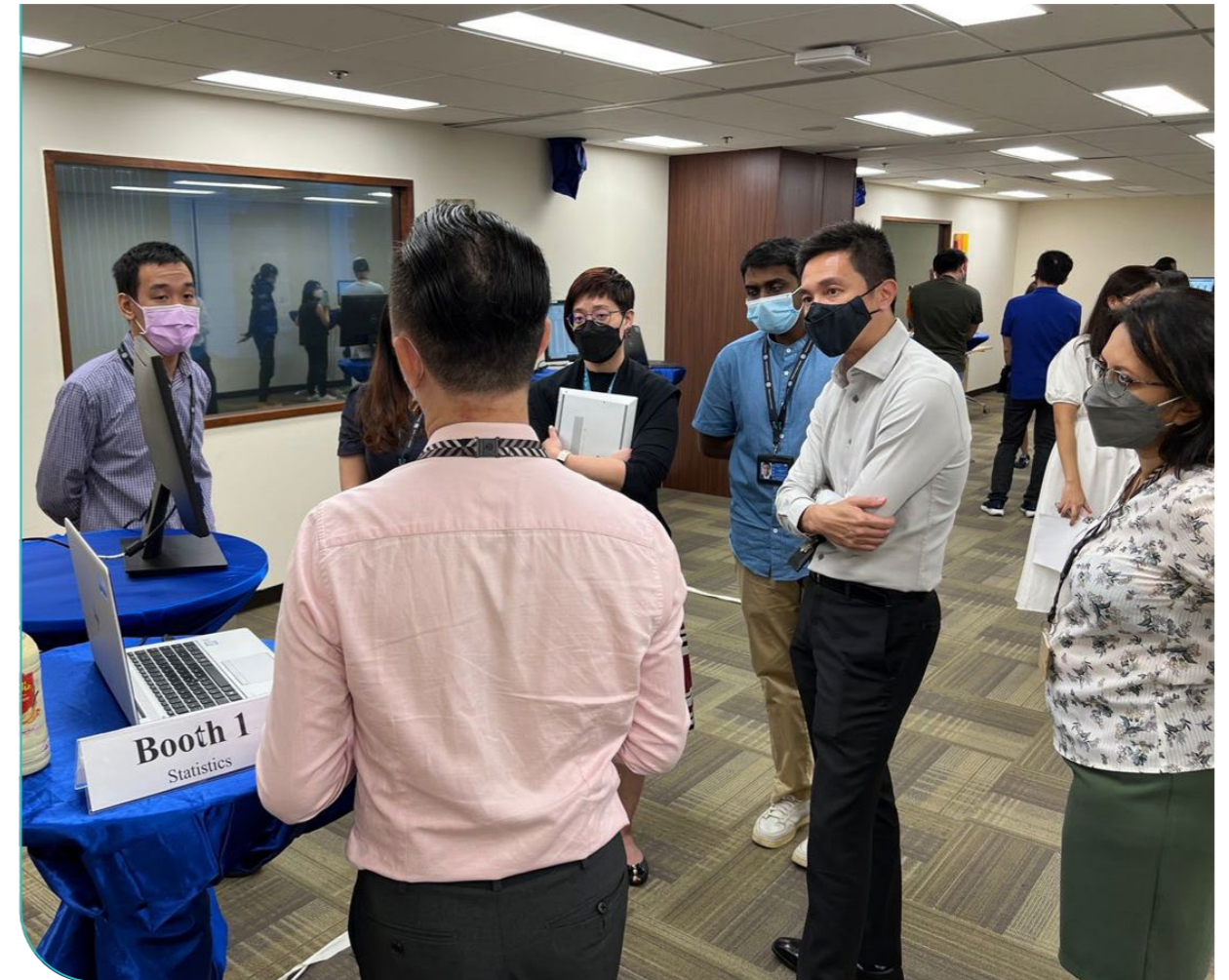

## CNB Workplan Seminar 2022

The CNB Workplan Seminar (WPS) was held on 31 May 2022. The event was graced by Associate Professor Muhammad Faishal Ibrahim, Minister of State for the Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of National Development.

The theme for WPS 2022 was 'Transforming Enforcement, Education, and Engagement for a Drug-Free Singapore', and featured CNB's efforts in leveraging technology to enhance operational capabilities, strengthening the supervision regime to reduce the risk of relapse, and sustaining engagement with key partners through new PDE initiatives.

In his speech, Assoc Prof Faishal highlighted CNB's progress in leveraging technology to strengthen drug enforcement efforts, and reiterated the need to work alongside our strong network of community and international partners to achieve a drug-free Singapore.

## Portable Drug Screening Test Kits

During WPS 2022, CNB also showcased how the portable drug screening test kits, which were launched in 2022, can augment drug screening

capabilities on the ground by detecting unknown substances in exhibits instantaneously in order to facilitate more efficient investigations. The test kit can detect a variety of drugs.

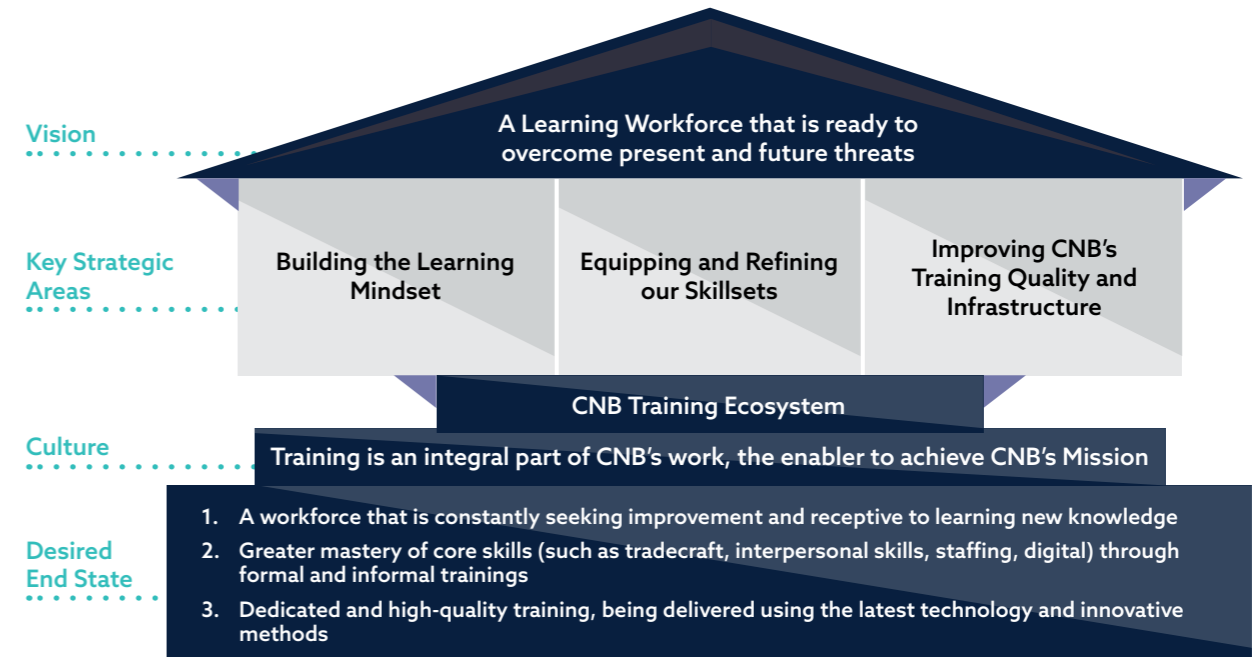

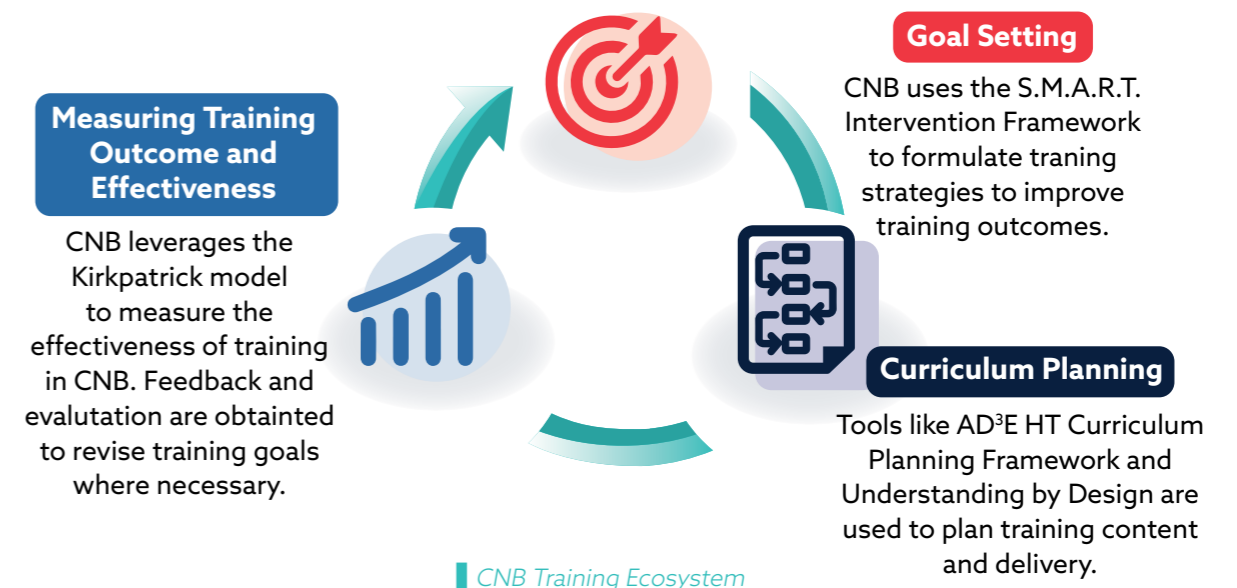
present and future threats. The key strategic areas of the CNB Training Masterplan are:

### Digitalisation Roadmap

Introduced in 2022, the CNB Digitalisation Roadmap seeks to upskill officers to become more digitally-literate and to embrace the implementation of new technology projects. It also aims to spur ground-up innovative solutions to daily tasks, and encourages growth mindset and learning agility among officers.

### Inaugural AGC-CNB Workshop

The inaugural AGC-CNB Workshop, jointly conducted by the Attorney-General Chambers (AGC) and CNB, was held in June 2022. The workshop allows participants to better understand the importance of chain-of-custody and proper documentation to drug investigations, as well as to train participants on court processes and court crafts.

A key highlight of the AGC-CNB Workshop was the experiential learning segments. Participants had hands-on experience recording field diary entries based on a mock-up video of a drug raid to familiarise themselves with proper documentation processes. Deputy Public Prosecutors from AGC also facilitated mock court hearings for the participants to provide a first-hand experience of being cross-examined in court.

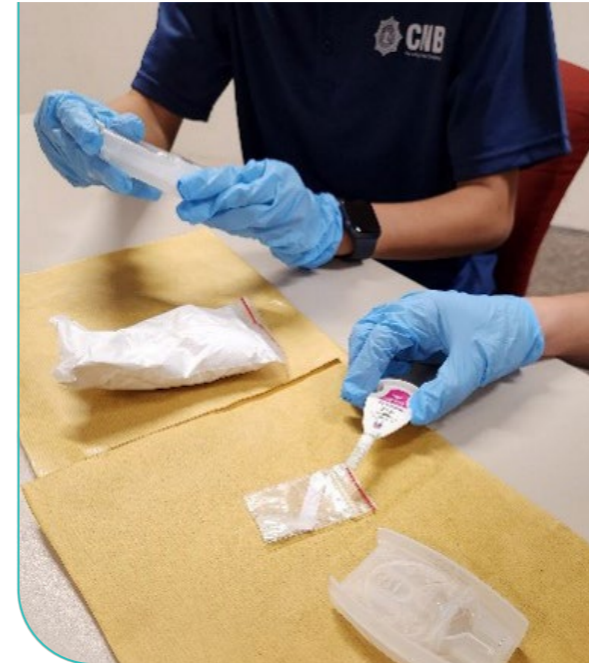

### Basic Enforcement Tradecraft Course

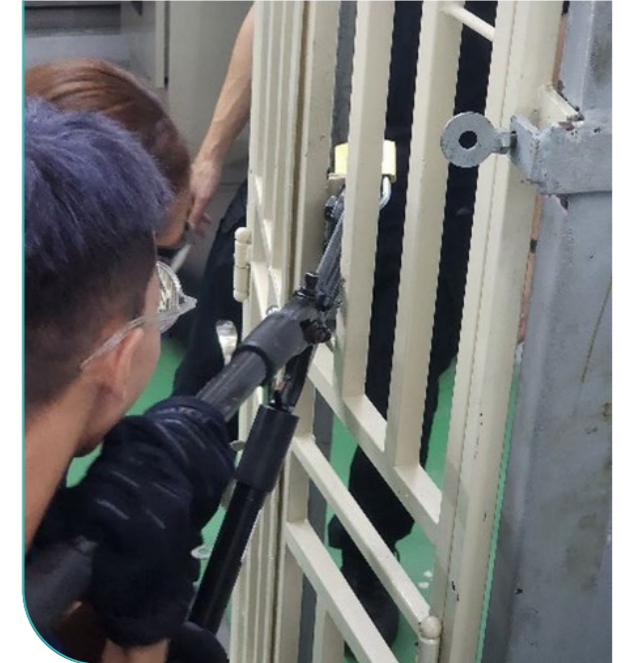
The Basic Enforcement Tradecraft Course (BETC) is a newly-designed course that aims to provide further tradecraft training for new officers and hones officers' communication techniques to improve public engagement.

During the pilot run in December 2022, officers underwent hands-on training and scenario-

based exercises for various tradecraft skills, such as operating portable drug test kits, body-worn cameras and the mobile diary, as well as to understand operational procedures and guidelines. The course also offered interactive classroom activities on public engagement, active listening skills and tips on de-escalating confrontational situations.

## Strengthening Mental Well-Being Support from Within

The importance of officers' mental well-being remained a focus in 2022, with greater emphasis on strengthening support on the ground. Formal structures of support, along with peer-level support, contribute to a more robust and extensive support network, and build a culture of care within CNB.

### Peer Supporter Network

CNB expanded the peer supporter network in 2022 and equipped the officers with crisis management skills. Peer supporters were trained in a wide variety of crisis intervention techniques for both individual and groups in crisis. Role-playing practices on crisis communication techniques and crisis group debriefings further cemented their understanding of the tools to provide crisis interventions. A total of 37 peer supporters had been certified by the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF) by the end of 2022, and have been deployed to provide intervention to CNB officers in various crisis situations.

### Fostering a Spirit of #TeamCNB

Psychoeducation materials, including practical tips on identifying signs of distress and helpful follow-up actions, were broadcasted to all officers to encourage and empower them to provide mutual support for one another. Bureau-wide activities that promote and recognise camaraderie between peers were also organised throughout the year. In one such initiative, officers were invited to acknowledge and express gratitude towards colleagues who supported and encouraged them during tough times. These broadcasts, which highlighted the existing resources and support systems available, served to fortify CNB's resilience by tapping on collective strength from within the team.

### Let's look out for one another

How do we know when our colleagues need a helping hand? Are they just stressed or perhaps overwhelmed?

Some people may hide their struggles so that they don't worry their loved ones, friends or colleagues. Even though symptoms such as sadness can be easy to recognise, other symptoms may be less obvious.

Noticed a colleague's **drastic dip in work performance**? Has someone in your team recently **seen more redlines than usual**? Is your desk neighbour more **easily angered** by little things lately? There are all be signs that he or she may be experiencing symptoms of depression or anxiety.

#### Hidden signs of distress

- Changes in behaviours/ habits
- Dip in work performance
- More irritable/ easily angered

#### Warning signs of suicide

Warning signs may indicate that someone is suicidal. A colleague who behaves differently from normal by **withdrawing from social events or suddenly expressing their gratitude** for no particular reason may reveal a major change coming up in their life. **Feeling like a burden to the people in their lives** may also indicate a loss of meaning or self-worth.

#### How can we C.H.E.C.K. in with each other?

- Choose the right time and place for a private conversation.
- Have a plan on how to broach the subject sensitively.
- Explain that you've noticed them behaving differently from usual.
- Care for them by offering a listening ear to their struggles.
- Keep everything confidential - unless they endanger themselves or others.

# KEY OPERATIONS

In our rigorous enforcement against drug activities, we prevent the proliferation of drugs through intelligence, operations and investigations, guided by robust laws and policies. We collaborate with our Home Team, local and international partners to stem the flow of drugs into and within Singapore.

In 2022, together with SPF and the Immigration & Checkpoints Authority (ICA), CNB conducted 11 island-wide operations targeting drug traffickers and abusers, as well as 783 operations at our checkpoints to stem the flow of drugs into Singapore. CNB also dismantled 23 drug syndicates and their trafficking activities.

The following are some of the highlights from CNB operations conducted in 2022:

### More than 20kg Cannabis Seized in a Drug Hideout

CNB arrested 102 suspected drug offenders in an island-wide operation from 9 to 13 May 2022, and seized controlled drugs of about 6,227g of heroin, 724g of 'Ice', 20,438g of cannabis, 3g of New Psychoactive Substances (NPS), one 'Ecstasy' tablet, two bottles of liquid suspected to contain GHB (gamma-hydroxybutyrate) and 16 methadone tablets.

In one of the cases, CNB officers arrested a 57-year-old Singaporean man in the vicinity of Bendemeer Road on 11 May 2022, and recovered a minute amount of heroin and cash amounting to \$3,200 from him. On the same day, CNB officers also arrested a 65-year-old Singaporean man in a residential unit in the same vicinity. A

total of about 821g of heroin and 16 methadone tablets were seized from the unit.

CNB followed up and arrested a 24-year-old Malaysian man on the ground floor of an apartment block in the vicinity of Braddell Hill, recovering about 952g of heroin and 4,093g of cannabis from him. The man was escorted to his hideout in the same block, where seven bundles containing about 4,298g of heroin and 16 bundles containing about 16,306g of cannabis were found and seized.

The drugs seized in this case have an estimated street value of more than \$1,039,000, and is sufficient to feed the addiction of about 2,900 cannabis abusers and 2,900 heroin abusers for a week.

## Close to 18kg of Heroin Seized at Woodlands Checkpoint

On 18 May 2022, ICA officers foiled an attempt to smuggle about 17,704g of heroin, 261g of 'Ice' and 2g of 'Ecstasy' tablets in an arriving Malaysia-registered car via the Woodlands Checkpoint. The 28-year-old Malaysian driver was immediately arrested and referred to CNB for investigations.

In a follow-up operation on 19 May 2022, CNB arrested two Malaysian men who were suspected to be the intended recipients of the packages.

The drugs seized are estimated to be worth close to \$1,295,000 and is sufficient to feed the addiction of about 8,430 heroin abusers and 150 'Ice' abusers for a week.

## Cannabis Plants and Edibles Seized in Island-wide Operation

In a two-week island-wide drug operation from 10 to 21 October 2022, CNB arrested 117 suspected drug offenders and seized controlled drugs of about 38g of heroin, 52g of 'Ice', 254g of cannabis, 180g of cannabis products, three cannabis plants, 7g of New Psychoactive Substances (NPS), 4g of 'Ecstasy' tablets, five LSD (lysergic acid diethylamide) stamps and a bottle of liquid suspected to contain GHB (gamma-hydroxybutyrate).

In one case on 15 October 2022, ICA officers at the Parcel Post Section detected five packets of candy suspected to contain cannabis. CNB officers launched a follow-up operation and arrested a 26-year-old Singaporean man and 23-year-old Singaporean woman for suspected drug offences on the same day.

In another operation on 19 October 2022, ICA officers at the Parcel Post Section detected a parcel of 19 packets of candy suspected to contain cannabis. CNB officers launched a

follow-up operation and arrested a 30-year-old Singaporean man for suspected drug offences on the same day. About 96g of vegetable matter believed to be cannabis and three potted plants believed to be cannabis were seized from the unit, along with various equipment used for the cultivation of cannabis plants.

## 38 Suspected Drug Offenders Arrested for Drug Transactions Conducted on Chat Applications

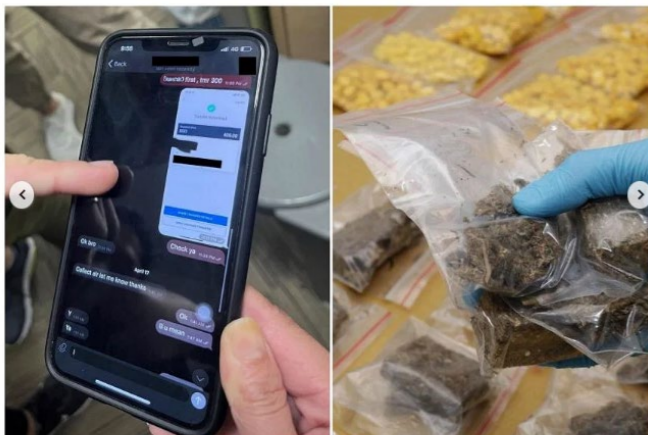
A total of 38 suspected drug offenders were arrested by CNB in an island-wide operation conducted on 18 and 19 April 2022, targeted at

drug transactions conducted through encrypted chat applications. A total of about 191g of 'Ice', 718g of cannabis, 4g of ketamine, 4g of cocaine, 714g of 'Ecstasy' tablets, multiple LSD (lysergic acid diethylamide) stamps, 201 Erimin-5 tablets and two bottles of liquid suspected to contain GHB (gamma-hydroxybutyrate) were seized.

In one of the cases on 18 April 2022, a 26-year-old Singaporean man was arrested on suspicion of being involved in drug transactions conducted on Telegram. A total of about 173g of crystalline substances believed to contain 'Ice', 488g of cannabis, 713g of 'Ecstasy' tablets, 51 Erimin-5 tablets, multiple LSD (lysergic acid diethylamide) stamps and one bottle of liquid suspected to contain GHB (gamma-hydroxybutyrate) were seized from his residence. A 24-year-old Singaporean man who later visited the same residential unit was also arrested for suspected drug offences.

## 96 Suspected Drug Offenders Arrested in Island-wide Operation

CNB arrested a total of 96 suspected drug offenders in a six-day island-wide operation

from 6 to 11 November 2022. Controlled drugs of about 146g of heroin, 882g of 'Ice', 3,624g of cannabis, 402g of ketamine, 6g of New Psychoactive Substances (NPS), 243g of 'Ecstasy' tablets, 685 Erimin-5 tablets, 219 LSD (lysergic acid diethylamide) stamps and 23 bottles of liquid suspected to contain GHB (gamma-hydroxybutyrate) were seized.

The youngest arrested in this island-wide operation is a 14-year-old suspected drug trafficker. On 7 November 2022, a 17-year-boy was arrested in the vicinity of South Buona Vista Road, and about 371g of cannabis and drug paraphernalia were recovered. He was escorted to his residential unit in the same vicinity and about 36g of cannabis and drug paraphernalia were seized. The 14-year-old boy was arrested in a follow-up operation conducted on 8 November, and about 9g of cannabis and drug paraphernalia were seized from the boy's home.

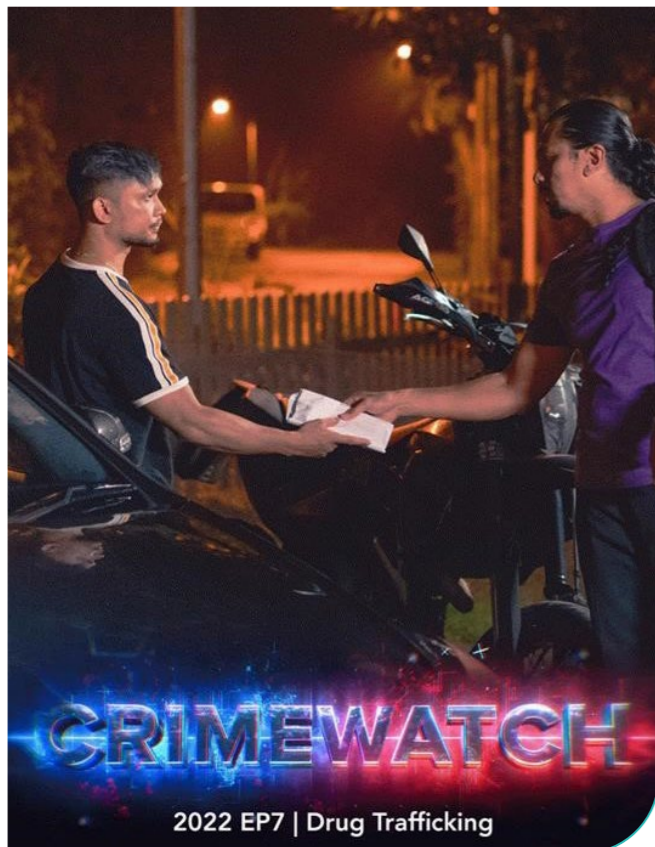

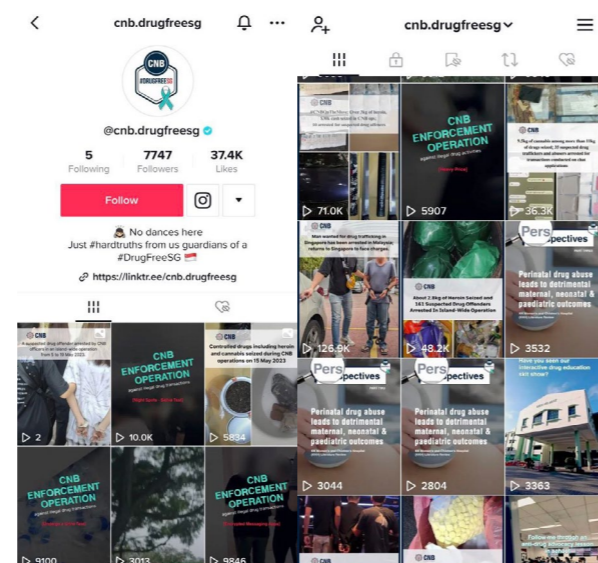
A CNB anti-drug operation from September 2018 was featured on Crimewatch in November and December 2022. The re-enactment depicted how CNB officers tracked down the drug traffickers and recovered the drugs, despite the suspects attempting to dispose of their drugs via the rubbish chute. The case highlighted the lengths that drug offenders would go to evade arrest, and the resilience of CNB officers to bring these offenders to justice.

CNB produced five corporate videos under the #CNB247 series that provided insights into the multi-faceted work and roles of CNB officers. The series highlights the key aspects of



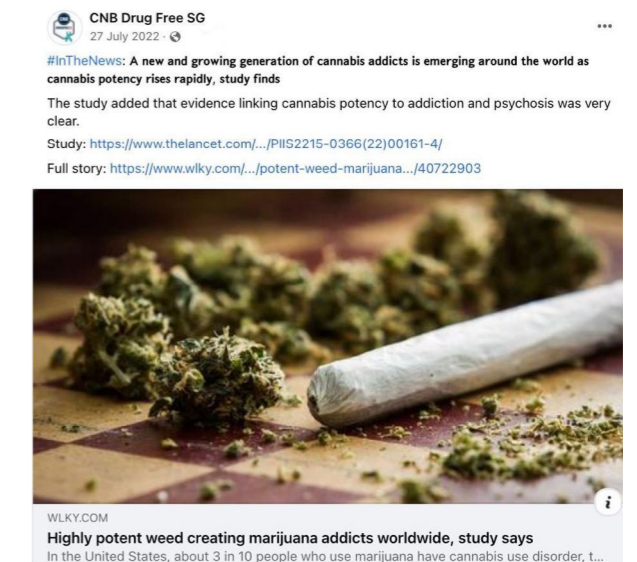

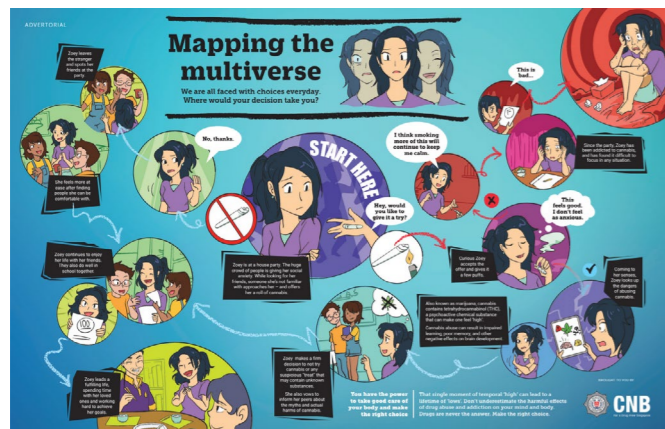
### 'Be Careful, Max!'

### Interactive PDE Skits

CNB's interactive skits educate and engage students on the dangers of drug abuse through humour and themes relatable to youths today. The skits also incorporate a Q&A session for primary and secondary school students to strengthen their understanding of the anti-drug message, and facilitated intervention scenes for post-secondary school students to experience handling scenarios such as peer pressure.

### Integrating PDE Messages in MOE School Syllabus

CNB worked with the Ministry of Education (MOE) to integrate suitable PDE messages in the school syllabus to ensure a strong PDE foundation among youths in Singapore. Anti-drug content has been incorporated into the refreshed Character and Citizenship Education (CCE) curriculum, which was rolled out for Secondary 1 and Secondary 3 students in 2021 and 2022 respectively.

During CCE classes, teachers facilitate discussions with students on contemporary issues, including the topic of drug abuse. Students are taught to recognise impulsive and addictive behaviours that harm one's mental and physical well-being, as well as strategies for self-control and managing negative peer influences. Students are also encouraged to make responsible decisions by considering how their actions can affect themselves and others, and to look out for peers in need and refer them to a trusted adult.

# PARTNERING THE LOCAL COMMUNITY IN THE FIGHT AGAINST DRUGS

In our engagement efforts, we work actively with the local community to garner strong societal support to create a Singapore without drugs.

## Anti-Drug Abuse Campaign

An anti-drug abuse campaign was organised by CNB to commemorate the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking that falls annually on 26 June. The theme for in 2022 was 'Community Resilience' to showcase the joint efforts between CNB and the community in promoting the anti-drug cause.

### DrugFreeSG Light-Up

To commemorate the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking that falls annually on 26 June, a total of 35 community partners, including eight new partners, illuminated their buildings and structures in green or white, the colours of the anti-drug ribbon, to show their support for the anti-drug cause.

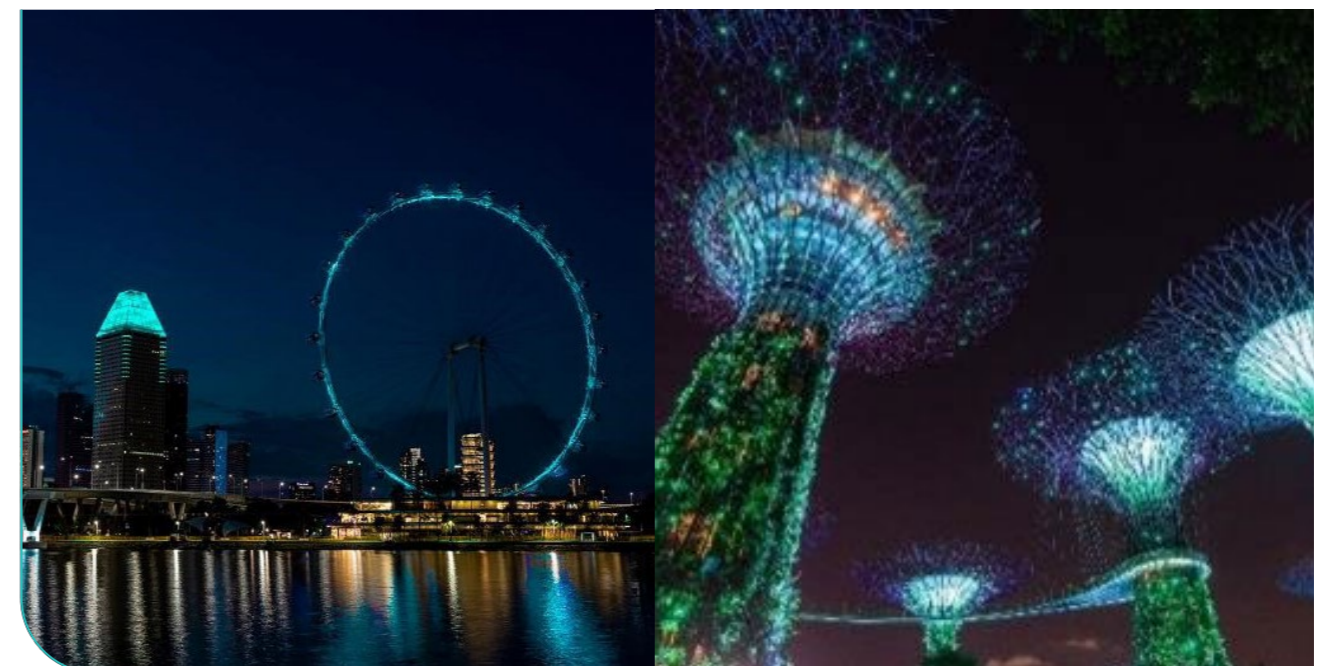

## DrugFreeSG Pop-Ups

Two DrugFreeSG Pop-Ups were held in June and July 2022.

The first Pop-Up was held from 19 June to 3 July 2022 at Yishun Public Library, where children and youths could learn about the harmful effects of drugs. Visitors also participated in a series of activities ranging from arts and crafts to quizzes.

Another DrugFreeSG Pop-Up was held from 26 June to 3 July 2022 at Suntec City. The Pop-Up comprised a series of experiential activities, including two immersive rooms that simulated the negative effects of drug abuse through multi-sensory experiences, and educational content on the dangers of drug abuse. Visitors could also pledge for a drug-free Singapore by folding and dropping an anti-drug ribbon into an interactive pledging mechanism. The Pop-Up attracted more than 8,500 participants.

## DrugFreeSG Video Competition

The DrugFreeSG Video Competition encourages youths interested in video production to creatively produce short videos with anti-drug narratives. The competition attracted 93 entries (38 from the Youth category and 55 from the Young Adults category), with a total of 339 participants.

A virtual videography workshop was also held in April 2022 to equip participants with filmmaking techniques, as well as knowledge on the harms of drugs. The workshop attracted a total of 99 participants.

In 2022, approximately 48,800 upper primary students from 122 schools took part in the anti-drug ambassador activity (AAA). The AAA is a booklet filled with interactive and engaging activities to educate young students on the dangers and consequences of drug abuse. An Anti-Drug Montage Competition is also held alongside as a fringe activity for schools to show

their support for a drug-free Singapore through their artwork.

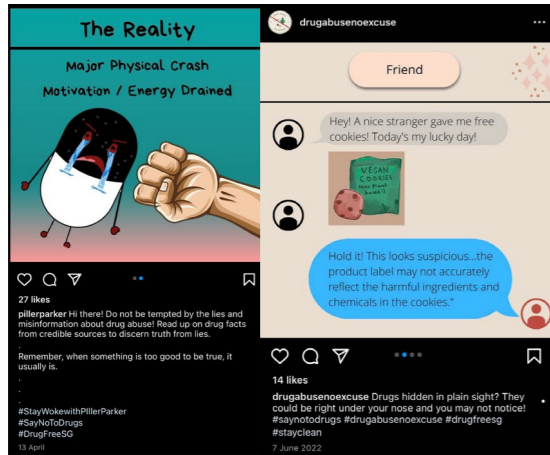

## Collaboration with Institutes of Higher Learning

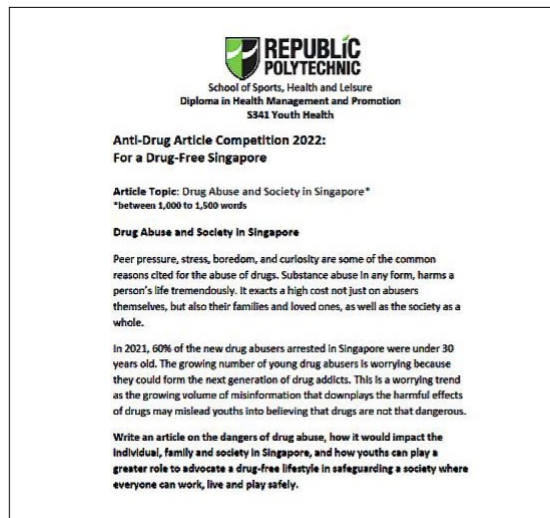

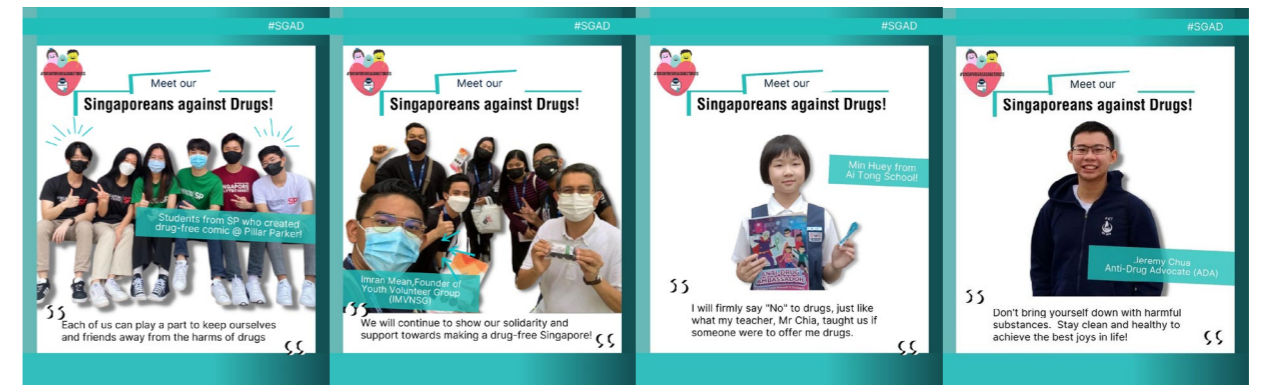

Launched in 2017, the Dadah Itu Haram ('DIH' or 'Drugs are Forbidden') campaign is a ground-up, community-nuanced initiative which supports anti-drug efforts within the Malay-Muslim community.



## Outreach at Key Community Touchpoints

Mosques and barbershops are key community touchpoints to amplify the DIH message.

In 2022, nine outreach events, led by Associate Professor Muhammad Faishal Ibrahim, Minister of State for the Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of National Development, were conducted at mosques to engage congregants after Friday prayers. Assoc Prof Faishal also visited 19 barbershops in 2022 to engage the barbers and their customers on the DIH campaign's messages, and to rally the barbers' support to amplify the anti-drug message.

Besides sharing by CNB officers on the dangers of drug abuse, religious officers from the mosques also spoke on the importance of staying away from drugs. Peer counsellors from the Singapore Anti-Narcotics Association (SANA) were also invited to share the consequences of drug abuse and the importance of making the right choice.

## Promoting a Drug-Free Lifestyle through Sports

To encourage youths towards a healthy, drug-free lifestyle through sports, CNB partnered with various community groups to organise sporting activities.

### Sepaktakraw Competition

On 5 February 2022, a launch event with the Singapore Sepaktakraw Federation (PERSES) was held, where Associate Professor Muhammad Faishal Ibrahim, Minister of State for the Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of National Development, presented team jerseys bearing the slogan 'Sepaktakraw Bebas Dadah' (or 'Drug-Free Sepaktakraw') to 27 team managers. CNB also conducted PDE talks to the youth trainees from the SportCares programme.

In September 2022, CNB partnered with PERSES to organise a sepaktakraw competition. Targeted

at youths below 18 years old, the tournament was held over two days and saw participation from more than 130 youths.

### DIH Ramadan Outreach 2022

'Date Your Loved Ones Today!' (DYLOT!) is an anchor event of CNB's Ramadan outreach under the DIH campaign. The initiative serves to remind families to spend time with their loved ones, strengthen family relationships and lead healthy drug-free lifestyles, through the distribution of dates.

On 10 April 2022, in collaboration with Muhammadiyah Association and Kampong Glam Café, and with the support of DIH volunteers, packets of dates were handed out to members of the public in the Wisma Geylang Serai and Kampong Glam districts.

## BOTHAIPORULAI ETHIRTHU NIRPOM CAMPAIGN

The Bothaiporulai Ethirthu Nirpom ('BEN' or 'We Stand United Against Drugs') campaign was launched in 2019 to expand anti-drug outreach to the Indian community.

### Getting the Kicks from Football and Teamwork

'Getting the Kicks from Football and Teamwork' is a football mentorship programme led by SINDA Football Club in collaboration with CNB. Targeted at Indian youths, the mentorship programme aims to promote youth development and strengthen resilience through sports.

Two sessions were held on 19 February and 25 June 2022, and attracted 130 youth participants. Collaterals and jerseys bearing anti-drug messages were handed out to the participants to remind them to stay away from drugs. Participants also attended PDE talks

conducted by CNB officers and youth leaders, which highlighted the harms of drug abuse and the importance of leading a drug-free lifestyle.

## MAINTAINING STRONG INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

We also work with like-minded international partners to uphold the international space for a zero-tolerance approach to drug abuse.

Global shifts in attitudes towards drugs have been observed in recent years, fuelling the liberalisation of drug policies in some countries.

Given Singapore's close links to our neighbouring countries, regional and international developments will invariably impact Singapore's national drug enforcement strategy. International engagement is thus an integral part of CNB's mission to curb the flow of harmful drugs into Singapore and to preserve and protect Singapore's drug policy space.

The easing of international border controls has allowed CNB to resume engagement with our regional and international partners at physical meetings, conferences and events, on top of virtual engagements. Such meetings enable CNB to build and maintain warm ties with our foreign counterparts, foster greater partnerships and cooperation to safeguard Singapore's interests in the international drug fora.

## Fostering Close Collaborations with ASEAN Partners

CNB remains committed to working with ASEAN countries to keep the region drug-free. CNB cooperates actively with foreign law enforcement agencies in the exchange of operational information and best practices through bilateral and multilateral meetings, trainings and international conferences on a regular basis.

### 43<sup>rd</sup> ASEAN Senior Officials on Drug Matters

The ASEAN Senior Officials on Drug Matters (ASOD) meeting is the key ASEAN platform where drug policies are discussed and adopted. The 43<sup>rd</sup> ASOD meeting was hosted by Malaysia and held in Kuala Lumpur from 31 October to 4 November 2022. Mr Sam Tee, Director CNB, headed the Singapore delegation, and proposed for a joint ASEAN statement to be delivered at the 67<sup>th</sup> Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) in 2024 to showcase ASEAN's solidarity and reiterate our commitment towards our shared vision of a drug-free ASEAN. The other ASEAN Member States (AMS) were agreeable to Singapore's proposal.

Mr Sng Chern Hong, Deputy Director of CNB for Policy and Administration, presented on Singapore's drug situation and our efforts to combat the drug problem, such as CNB's preventive drug education approach and the use of social media platforms such as TikTok to share short and informative videos on the dangers of drug abuse. Mr Sng also highlighted concerns over drug abuse among youths with more permissive attitudes towards drugs.

The Singapore delegation also attended various group meetings on drug research, enforcement, rehabilitation and preventive drug education to present and exchange best practices in tackling the drug problem.

### 13<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Drug Monitoring Network Meeting

CNB attended the 13<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Drug Monitoring Network (ADMN) meeting hosted virtually by Thailand from 24 to 25 August 2022. The ADMN is a key platform for ASEAN countries to exchange yearly domestic drug situations

and contribute to the formulation of the annual ASEAN Drug Monitoring Report. During the meeting, CNB shared on Singapore's drug situation and highlighted our preventive drug education efforts in countering the menace of drugs in Singapore. CNB also reiterated our commitment in working with ASEAN countries to keep Singapore and ASEAN drug-free.

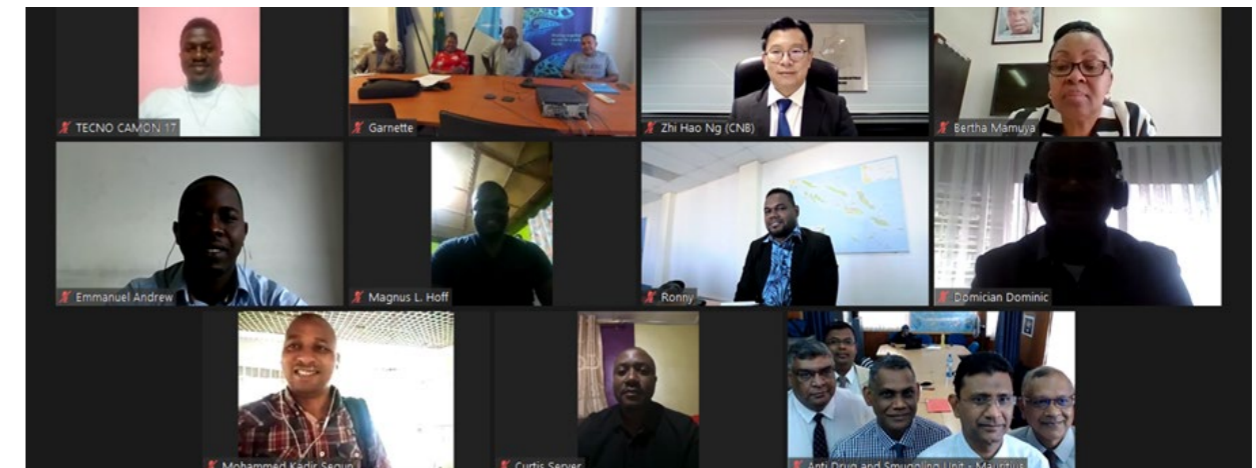
## Building Strong Ties with International Counterparts

CNB recognises the importance of international cooperation and sharing of best practices in tackling the world drug problem, and values training and workshops as integral opportunities to facilitate the exchange of expertise and cultivate strategic partnerships with like-minded countries.

### Virtual Training on Singapore's Drug Control Strategy

A virtual training on Singapore's drug control strategy was conducted on 20 and 21 July 2022 for a total of 33 international partners from Liberia, Mauritius, Nigeria, Solomon Islands

and Tanzania. During the training, Mr Leon Chan, Deputy Director of CNB for Operations, highlighted drug abuse and trafficking as universal problems, which are made more challenging with the advent of darknet and encrypted social messaging applications.

## Workshop on Singapore's Drug Control

CNB organised a Workshop on Singapore's Drug Control for our international partners from 25 to 28 October 2022 in Singapore, under the auspices of the Singapore Cooperation Programme. The workshop brought together senior officials from law enforcement and drug control regulatory agencies of 17 countries from all over the world.

During the four-day workshop, CNB shared with participants Singapore's comprehensive harm prevention strategy encompassing upstream preventive drug education, tough laws and rigorous enforcements, as well as the rehabilitation and aftercare programmes dedicated to help ex-drug offenders stay drug-free. CNB also partnered with various agencies to host the participants for site visits.

The regional workshop is an annual event that gathers officials working in the field of drugs to exchange information on the national and regional drug situations, as well as efforts undertaken to tackle the drug problem.

## 65<sup>th</sup> Commission on Narcotic Drugs

The 65<sup>th</sup> Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) was held from 14 to 18 March 2022 at the Vienna International Centre, Austria. The Commission is one of the functional commissions of the United Nations' Economic and Social Council, and is the central drug policy-making body within the United Nations System.

The Singapore delegation, led by Mrs Josephine Teo, Minister for Communications and Information & Second Minister for Home Affairs, comprised 20 representatives from CNB, HSA, MHA and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA). Mrs Teo delivered Singapore's national statement through a pre-recorded video which highlighted Singapore's harm prevention approach in countering the drug problem, as well as Singapore's candidature for CND membership for the term 2024 to 2027.

CNB also co-organised a virtual side event on 15 March 2022 with UNODC and the ASEAN Training Centre for Preventive Drug Education, titled *Preventive Drug Education (PDE): Adapting to the Covid-19 Pandemic*. The side event was attended by close to 90 participants, and showcased how Singapore sustained our PDE efforts despite COVID-19, and highlighted the positive impact of our engagement within the community.

Through CNB's active participation at the negotiations of the CND resolutions, the Singapore delegation was able to protect Singapore's interests in international drug control policies.

# STATISTICS

## Singapore Drug Situation 2022

### Global Drug Situation

Globally, the number of drug abusers remains high, with many countries seeing a higher percentage of youths taking drugs than before, particularly cannabis. According to data from the UNODC World Drug Report 2022 (WDR 2022), an increase in the use of cannabis and amphetamines was observed in 2020. In Southeast Asia, methamphetamine seizures in 2020 saw a 30% increase from 2019. Countries in East and Southeast Asia and North America, are the main points of departure or transit of methamphetamine globally.

Cannabis, the most widely used drug worldwide, also saw an increase in both seizures and abusers. Singapore, being in close proximity to the producing countries, is vulnerable to the inflow of cannabis. This is exacerbated by the long-term trend of increasing tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) content, the psychoactive chemical substance in cannabis that causes abusers to feel 'high', in seized cannabis, which increases the health risks for those who consume it.<sup>1</sup>

The global shift in attitudes toward drugs has also led to the liberalisation of drug policies in some countries, as evident in the decriminalisation and/or legalisation of cannabis in Thailand and some states in the United States. In countries such as Uruguay and the United States, cannabis abuse among youths is high. It is also worrying to note that in countries that have legalised the use of cannabis, the proportion of people with psychiatric disorders and suicides associated with regular cannabis abuse has increased, alongside the number of hospitalisations.<sup>2</sup>

### Local Drug Situation in 2022

In 2022, CNB arrested 2,826 drug abusers, an increase of 4% from the 2,729 arrested in 2021.

The number of repeat drug abusers arrested increased by 13% to 2,024 in 2022, from 1,793 in 2021. The number of new drug abusers arrested decreased by 14% to 802 in 2022, from 936 in 2021. 50% of new abusers arrested were under 30 years old.

CNB made significant drug seizures in 2022. The drugs seized were estimated to have a street value of about S\$16.66 million. There was a 29% decrease in seizures of heroin to 68.22kg in 2022, from 95.43kg in 2021. Cannabis seizures saw, on the contrary, a 25% increase to 133.41kg in 2022, from 107.08kg in 2021. Seizures of crystalline methamphetamine (more commonly known as 'Ice') saw a 44% decrease to 28.15kg in 2022, from 49.95kg in 2021.

Methamphetamine, heroin, and cannabis were the three most commonly abused drugs in 2022, with 95% of drug abusers arrested abusing at least one of these three drugs. For new drug abusers, methamphetamine, cannabis and 'Ecstasy' were the three most commonly abused drugs, with 90% of new drug abusers arrested abusing at least one of these three drugs.

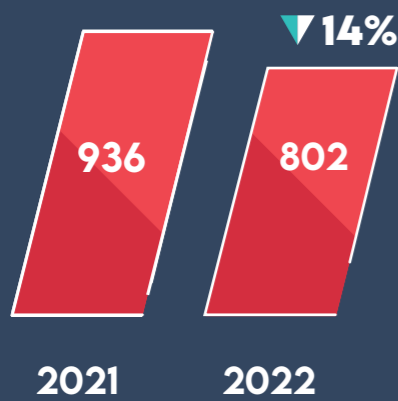

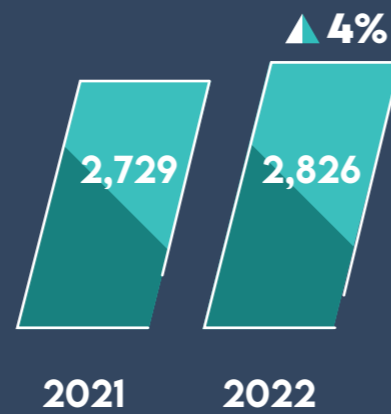

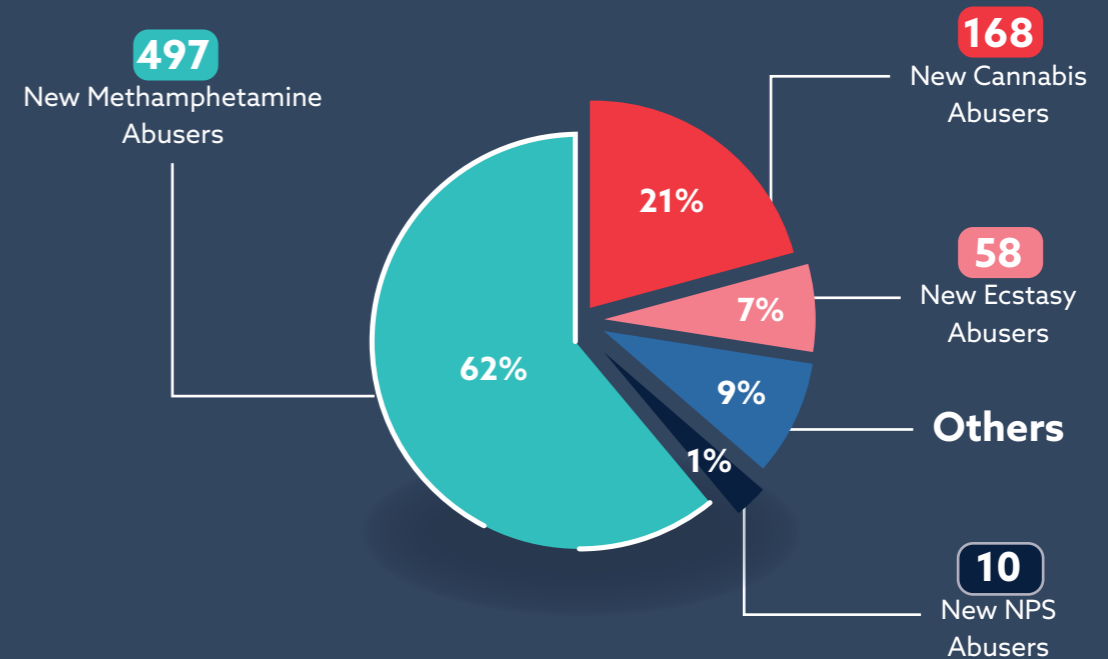

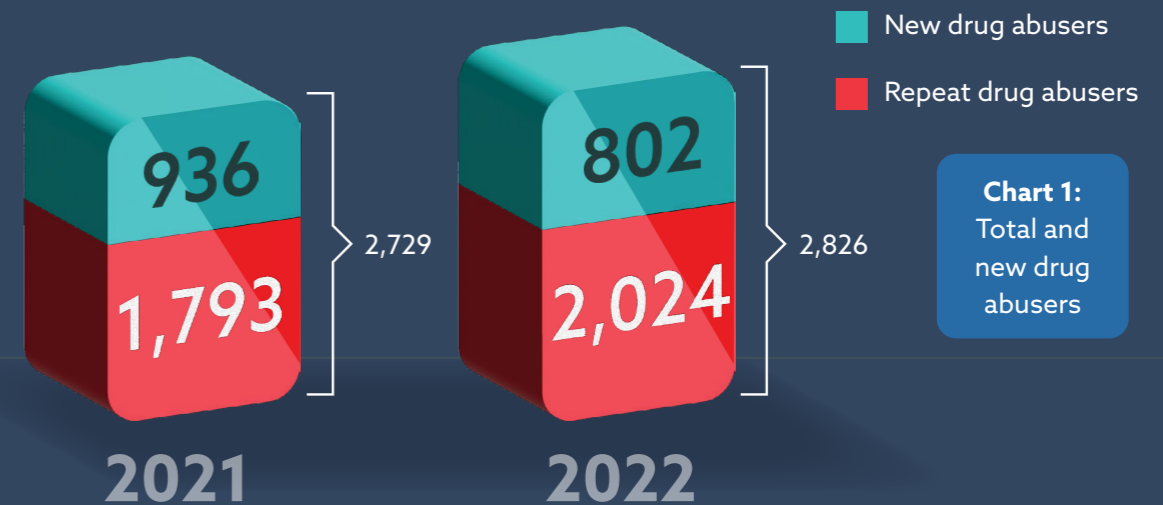
## New Drug Abusers by Drug Type

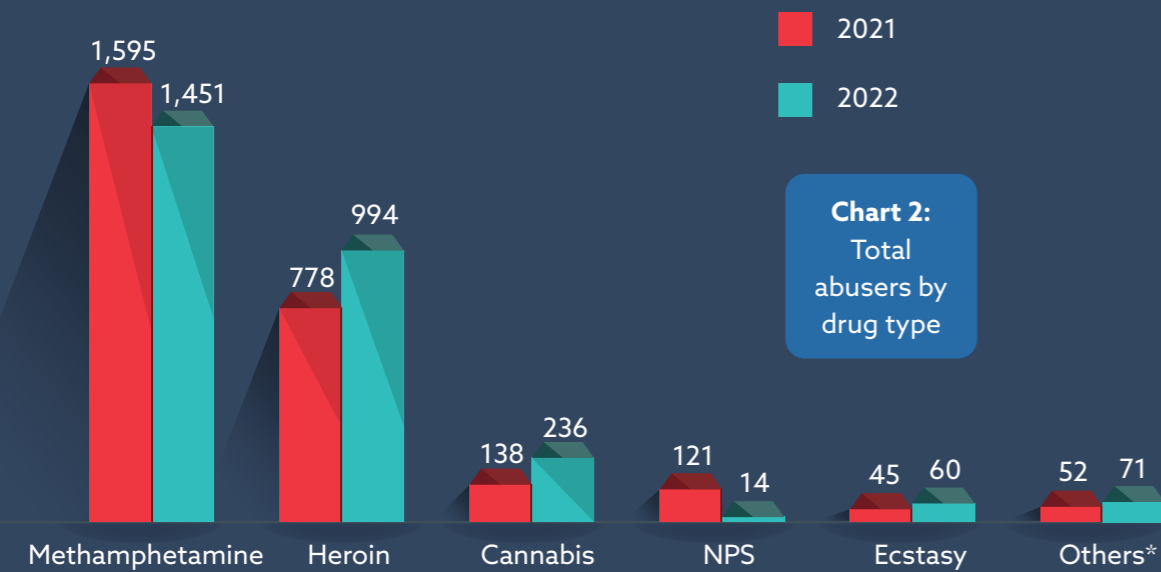


**Chart 1:** Total and new drug abusers

## Drug Abusers – By Drug Type

Methamphetamine, heroin, and cannabis were the three most commonly abused drugs in Singapore. 1,451 methamphetamine abusers (51%), 994 heroin abusers (35%) and 236 cannabis abusers (8%) were arrested in 2022. Refer to Chart 2.

The number of cannabis abusers arrested increased by 71% from 138 in 2021 to 236 in 2022. Out of the 236 cannabis abusers, about 61% are below the age of 30.

Of the 2,826 drug abusers arrested in 2022, 589 abusers (21%) were poly-drug abusers i.e. persons who abused more than one type of drug. Refer to Chart 2a.

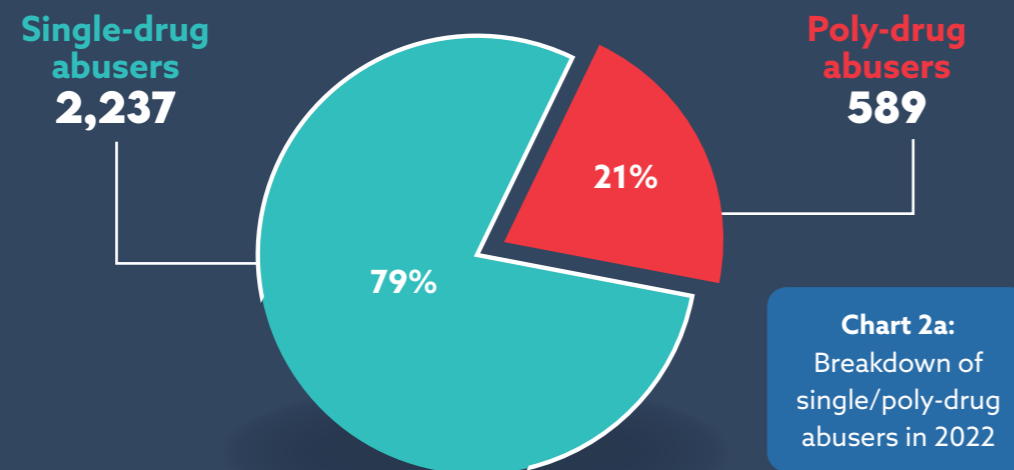
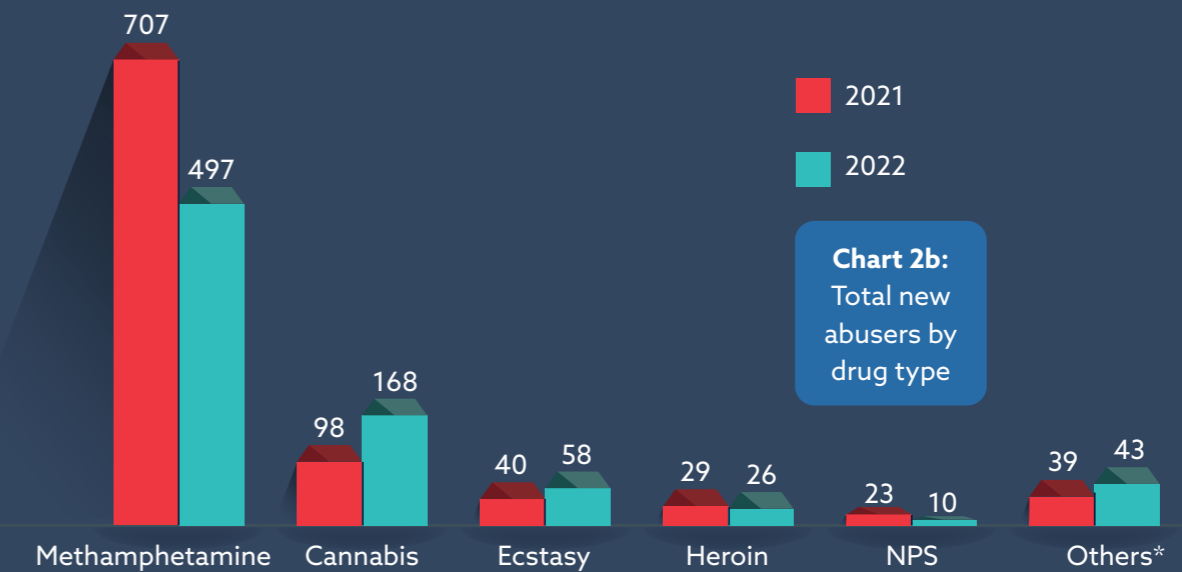


Chart 2a: Breakdown of single/poly-drug abusers in 2022

Methamphetamine abusers made up the largest proportion of all new abusers. Of the 802 new abusers arrested in 2022, 497 (62%) abused methamphetamine, which was a 30% decrease from the 707 arrested in 2021.

However, the number of new cannabis abusers arrested increased by 71% from 98 in 2021 to 168 in 2022. Refer to Chart 2b. Out of the 168 new cannabis abusers, 70% are below the age of 30.

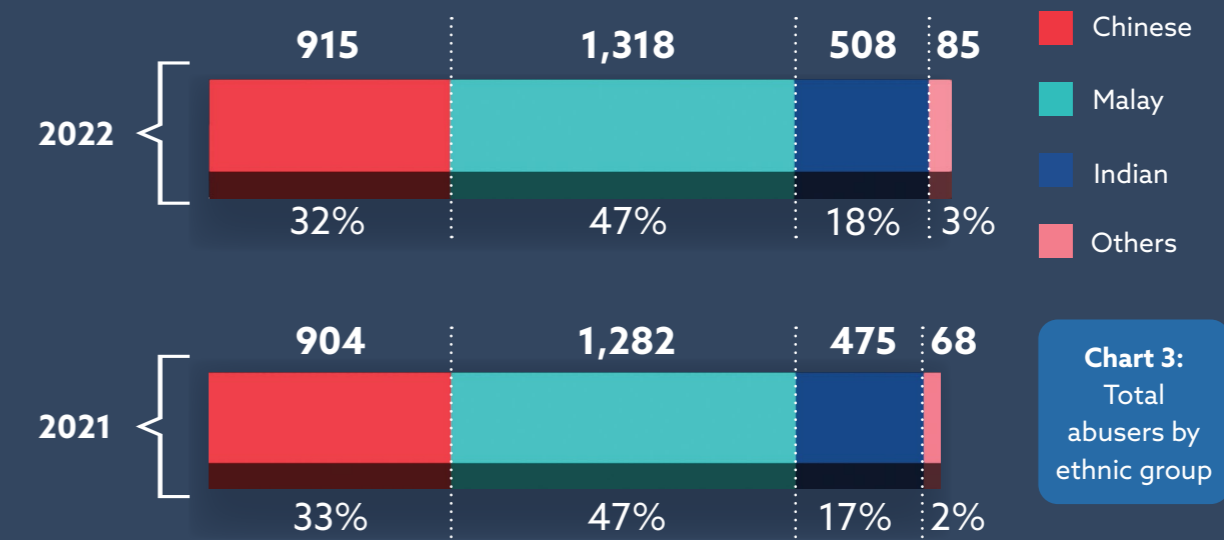
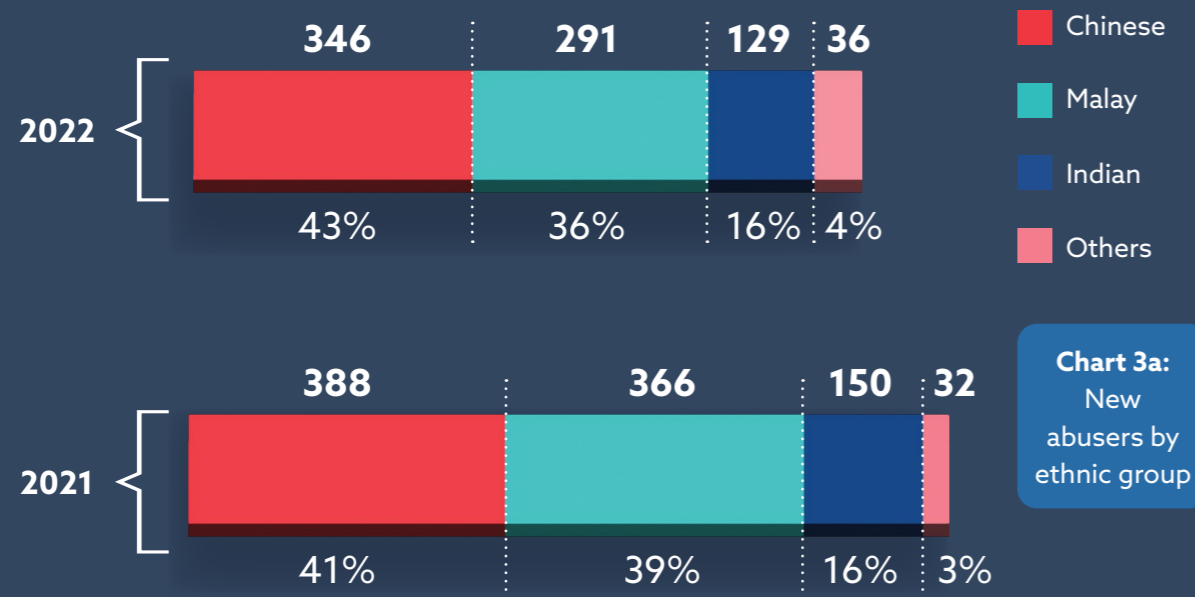


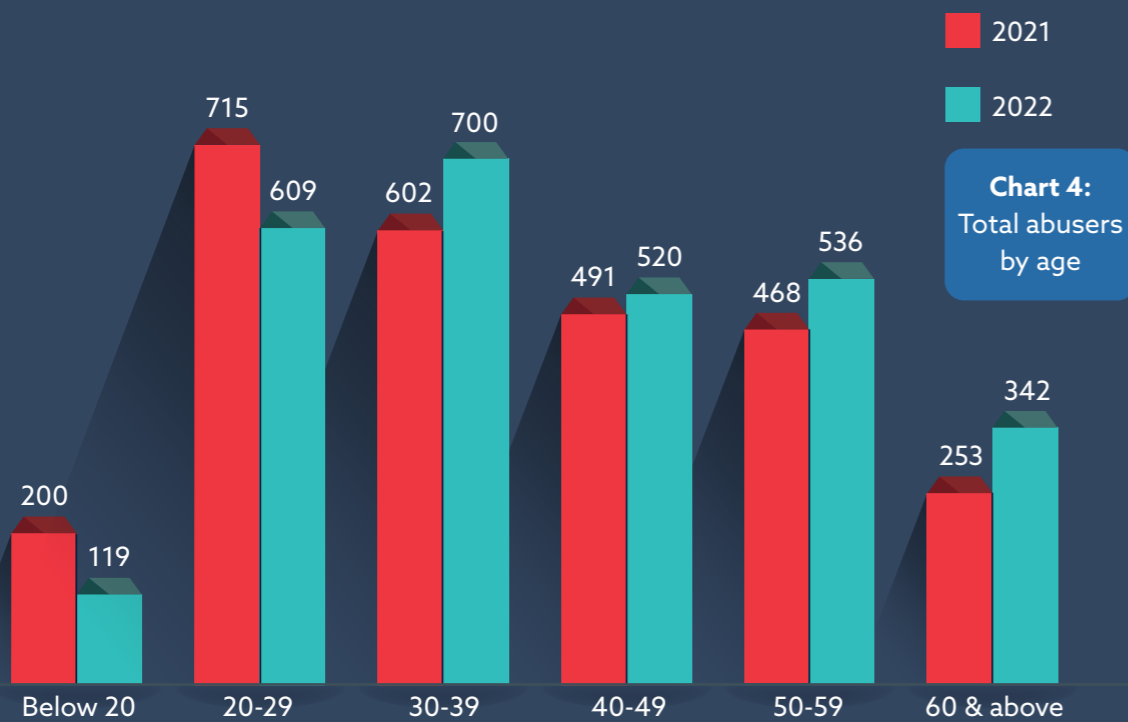
Chart 3: Total abusers by ethnic group

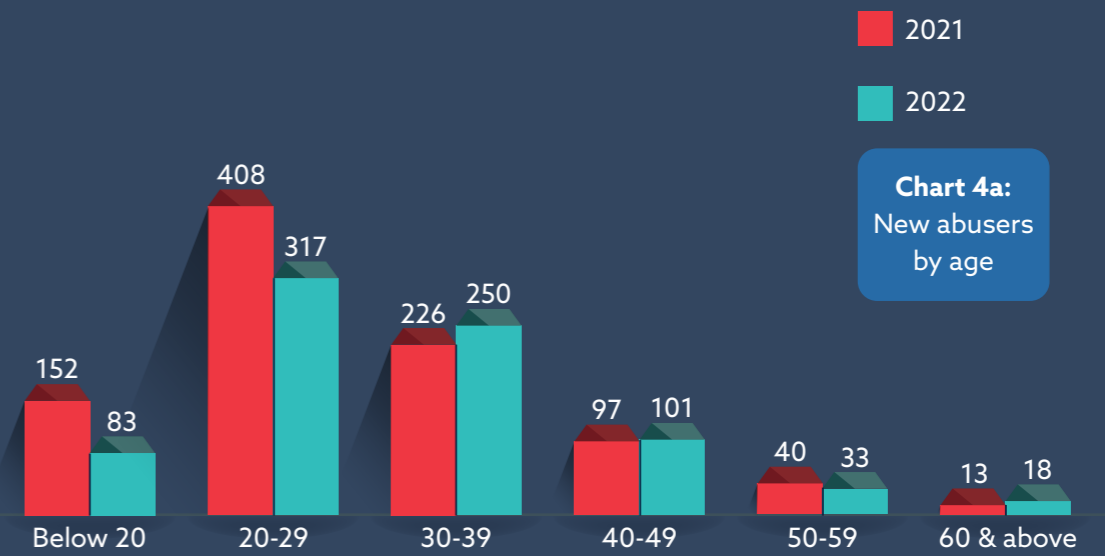


### Drug Abusers Arrested - By Age

In 2022, 728 (26%) of all drug abusers arrested were below 30 years old. Refer to Chart 4.

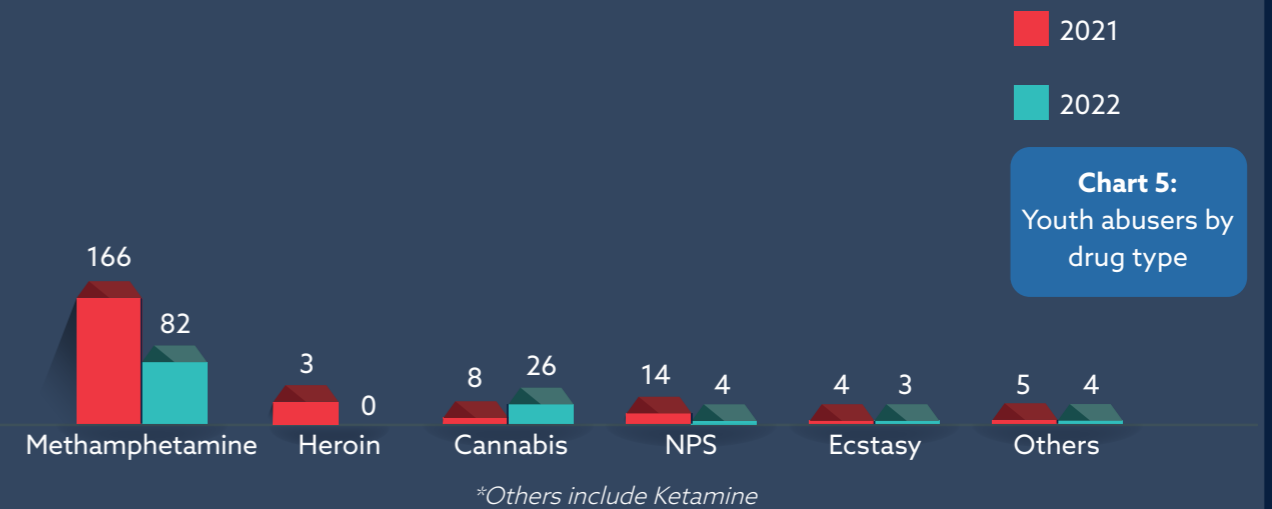

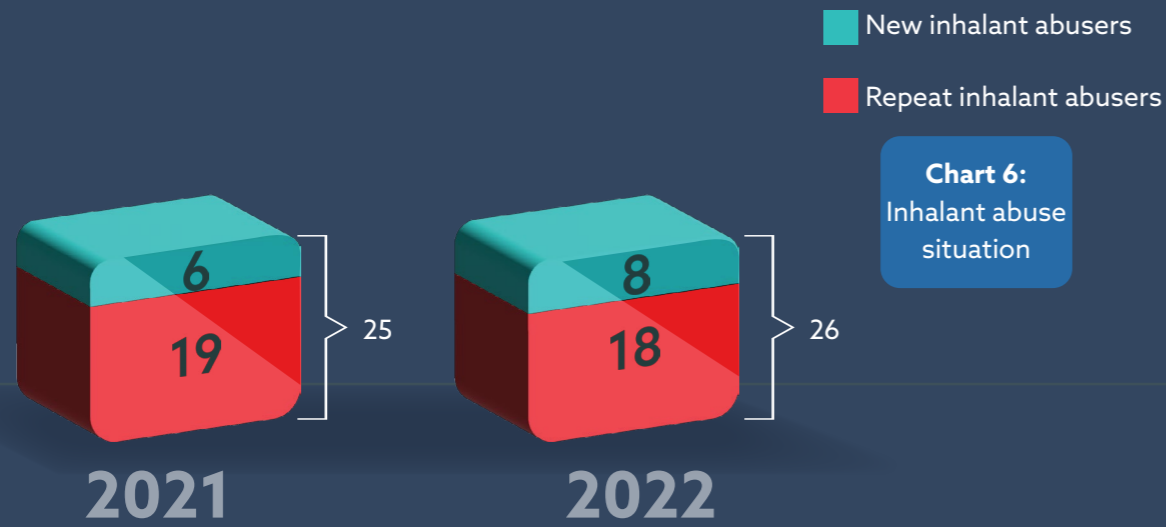
### Youth Drug Abusers - By Drug Type

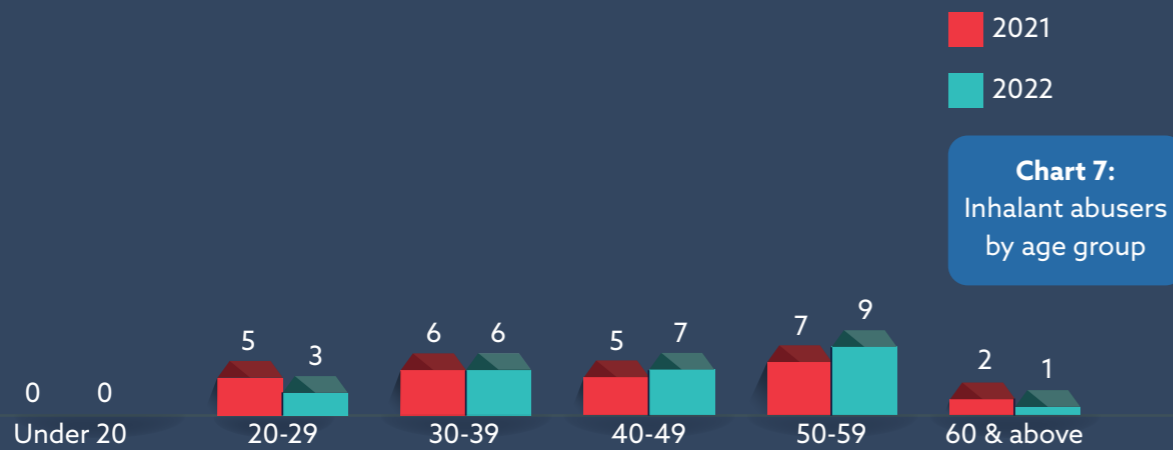


## Inhalant Abuse Situation in 2022

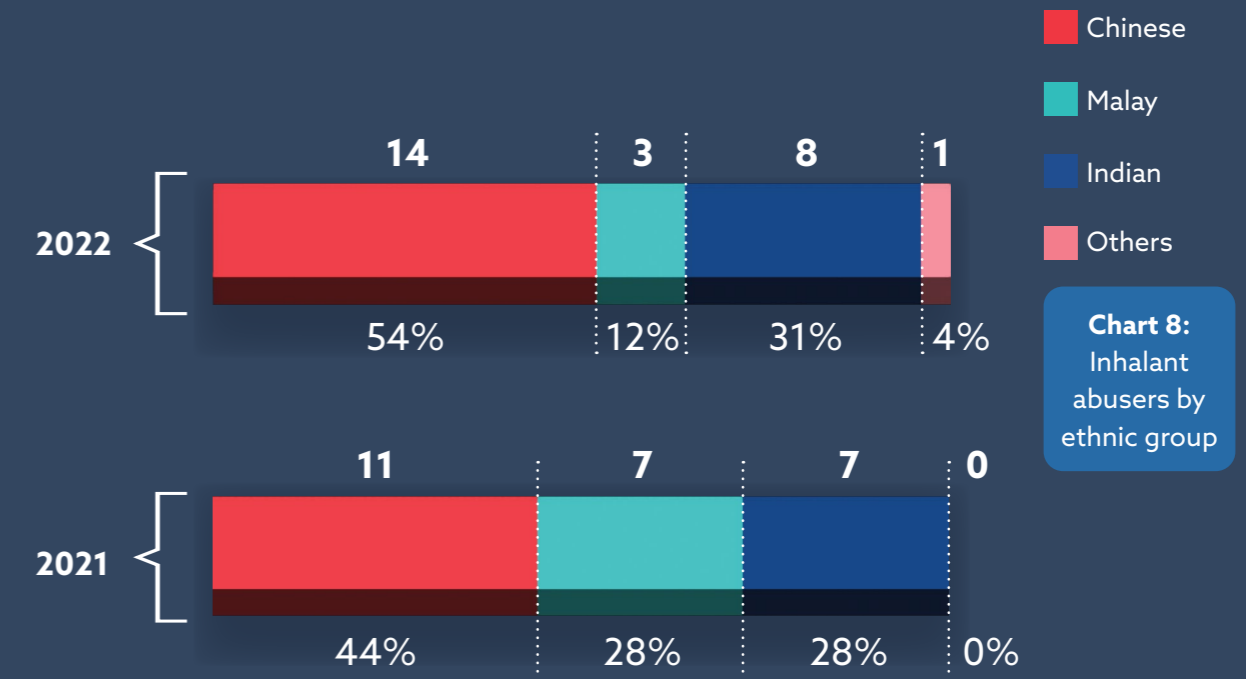
The number of inhalant abusers arrested in 2022 increased slightly to 26. Refer to Chart 6.
